The formal schedule of various schooner events appears elsewhere in this Newsletter. I would like to add the following notes and comments for your information and consideration.

By popular request, a cruise has been included in this year's schedule. It is not very long or elaborate but it should make for a fine week of sailing in company, socializing in the evenings and the chance to consider other schooner activities.

For those looking to go further afield, the Schooner Association of Nova Scotai is holding its annual Championship Races in Mahone Bay, near Lunenburg, during the third week of July, followed by the International Race. This year that race will be between the U.S. schooner Amberjack and a Nova Scotian champion who is yet to be decided.

The Schooner Association of Nova Scotia always welcome visiting vessels and invites them to participate in several of their races. Both Nick Craig and I did so last year. If any other owners would like to go, either Nick or I can give full details of the great time and hospitality which awaits all who care to make the trip.

This year is an extra special one in Gloucester—it is the 350th Anniversary of that town and so there are to be extra festivities—during—what is already a

splendid weekend. The City Fathers are also presenting a special commemorative trophy for the anniversary event.

Skippers should note that Fall events have been spaced out a little more this year, giving breathing room, allowing time to get back to work for a few days

and providing a little flexibility for contending with bad weather.

All in all, it should be a pretty good season, Good sailing.

Daniel Wins Nassau Race

The first schooner race of 1973 got underway early this year -- on March 6 to be exact -- and the winner was Mike Daniel's far-ranging schooner Agamemnon.

Organized by Mike, the 12:9-mile Nassau Schooner Race was open to all gaff-rigged schooners. The course was around that Paradise Island, that exotic piece of real estate that should be well-known to any gamblers who have visited the Bahamas. It was a boat-for-boat race and any sails could be used except spinnakers or gollywobblers.

There were four starters for this first event, which Mike told the local press, was intended as a little light relief from the high-powered ocean racing fever that sweeps Nassau around the beginning of March in the form of the glittering machines of the Southern Ocean Racing Conference.

Mike is looking for more entrants for next year and advises that the Bahamas Ministry of Tourism has offered a perpetual trophy to the winner of the event. Engrave silver-plate trophies go to the first, second and third place boats.

Second place in this year's race went to the schooner *Grand Turk* sailed by Jack Cowley. She finished only 20 seconds ahead of the third place vessel, the charter schooner *Keewatin*, owned by Ron Turner. The fourth boat to race was the schooner *Canadie*.

Mike is planning on at least a dozen entrants for next year's race — an event which, by the way, he intends to keep as informal as possible. It certainly sounds fun. Coral head-hopping among the cays and islands to the East of Paradise Island and beating up Nassau Harbor has its own particular thrill.

Uniform Rating Rule Is Close

The measurement committee, headed by Bruce Butterworth and Ron Kirby, has been working with Bill Ames, former Chief Measurer for Off Soundings Club, and Rod Johnstone, handicapper of many of our past schooner events, to arrive at a uniform measurement formula for handicapping the large variety of rigs, sizes and hull shapes inherent in all schooner races.

It was decided that such a formula must be flexible enough to accommodate the rules dictated by the local sponsor with regards to sails allowed and class division and simple enough so that owners could easily obtain the measurements with their vessel in the water. The formula adopted contains rig and boat characteristics only. All that will be required to get a rating for the majority, if not all, the races run by participating groups, will be a few elementary rig measurements such as the distance between the halvard block and gooseneck, the length of booms, the area between masts and the foretriangle. Hull measurements will include such basics as length, beam and inboard vertical depth -that's the depth between deck beams and the bottom of the bilge.

Since vessels normally fall into either working or racing rigs, handicaps for types of sails will be applied by a factor to each rig area affected. It will be high for overlapping genoas and gollywobblers and low or negative for gaff-headed sails.

The committee is presently establishing these factors based on results of previous races where data are available or can be approximated. Since, the committee has yet to come up with an exact formula, it will be touch and go to get all contestants rated in time for the Heritage Race at Block Island and the Martha's Vineyard Race the following weekend.

In order to facilitate the enormous job facing the Measurement Committee which must generate a rating or several ratings for each vessel, depending on the rules of each race, a measurement form will be sent to all known owners along with the race circulars for the Heritage and Vineyard Haven Races -- probably within a week.

Those skippers who anticipate racing in these or other schooner events this summer should complete the measurement form accurately and return to Bruce Butterworth, 400 Country View Drive, Warwick, R.I., 02886, prior to June 20, 1973. For those that have entered the Mystic Seaport Race in the past five years, only the inboard vertical depth measurement need be recorded since all other required measurements are on record.

Your cooperation in meeting the above deadline will relieve the local sponsors of last minute calculations of handicaps and should provide a fair rating for all vessels.



Cruise Schedule, July 1-6

Saturday, June 30th:

HERITAGE RACE, Block Island

Sunday, July 1, 1973:

LAY DAY (in case of postponement, the Heritage Race)

Monday, July 2nd:

BLOCK ISLAND TO NEWPORT -- 21 miles

Newport provides all facilities and has an ample anchorage. Possibility of scheduling a social gathering ashore.

Tuesday, July 3rd:

NEWPORT TO CUTTYHUNK -- 25 miles

Cuttyhunk, picturesque harbor of refuge at the crossroads of southern New England cruising.

Suggest planning to arrive as early as possible in the afternoon of this eve. of the Fourth of July; anchorage is sure to fill up jckly. Larger schooners can anchor outside if inner harbor too crowded, unless there are strong northerly or northeasterly winds. Beach cocktail party scheduled.

Wednesday, July 4th:

NO PLANNED ROUTE OR RENDEZVOUS

This day is set aside in case of bad weather and/or for each vessel to choose her own anchorage for the holiday. A good day to sail to New Bedford or other nearby shoreside ports for those wanting to change crews or to pick up crew. Most anchorages are likely to be exceptionally busy, so we ought not all descend on one place this evening.

Thursday, July 5th:

CUTTYHUNK TO EDGARTOWN -- 25 miles

Edgartown, one of the finest yacht harbors on the coast, with all facilities, and conveniently only eight miles from Vineyard Haven.

Friday, July 6th:

EDGARTOWN TO VINEYARD HAVEN -- 8 miles

Saturday, July 7th:

VINEYARD HAVEN SCHOONER RACE



and repeat for mizzen in space provided

dimensions for mainmast and fore triangle

DEFINITIONS

- B Distance from afterside of mainmast to aftermost position to which mainsail clew can be extended
- B1 Distance between the foreside of the mainmast and the afterside of the foremast
- J Horizontal distance from the forward side of the foremast to the point where the headstay intersects the stem head or bowsprit
- P Distance from the top of the mainboom when touching lowest point of gooseneck to main halyard block (peak halyard block for gaff rigged mainsails)
- P1 Distance from the top of the foreboom when touching lowest point of gooseneck to the highest block used for sails aft of the foremast (peak halyard block for vessels not using fisherman)
- P2 Distance from the highest halyard block used for headsails to the main deck
- P3 Distance from the top of the foreboom or extension thereof when touching the lowest point of gooseneck and resting parallel to the deck to the highest halyard block used for sails forward of the mainmast. If no fisherman is carried, use highest halyard block on afterside of mainmast
- IDD Distance from the underside of the main deck beams or extension thereof if trunk cabin to the top of the floor timbers at a point approximately amidships. CAUTION: DO NOT USE TOP OF CABIN SOLE BEAMS (see sketch)

If you have entered the Mystic Seaport Schooner Race in the past four years and there have been no changes which affect these dimensions, you need only fill in the interior depth dimension (IDD) which is not on file.
